Summary: In this meeting, we discussed Izzy Ngo's ('19) idea for a platform that centralises of school resources for the common curriculum classes and that may eventually branch out to support various other student groups. We also received updates the new student government website, regarding the IFG t-shirt situation after having received responses from administration, information on dining hall spaces and meetings with the dining hall committee as well as an upcoming DoS hiring talk on Tuesday, 8 Sept, 2-2.45pm and 2.45-3.30pm which students are encouraged to attend. A report on academics at Yale-NUS will be submitted to Dean Bailyn on Friday morning with meal-time discussion tables for students to air their views on their classes thus far. The student government will also be clarifying school-wide policies on absenteeism from classes due to student-organised events during term time.

Idea for Centralisation of school resources (Izzy '19)

- 1. She would like to start a platform more formal than facebook to communicate about the common curriculum
- 2. The impetus for the centralisation comes from the divergence/difference between different sections, different years etc. This creates a need for consistency that students are trying to solve on a grassroots level.
- 3. Sensing from DFs and RCAC is that yes, she has support from these bodies. Current status: team of 3 students are working on the project.
- 4. Genesis of project:
 - a. Whatsapp groups for each class.
 - i. e.g. CSI class "what's the need for different types of power", arranging study groups, taking photos of whiteboard diagrams, etc.
 - ii. From there, people are desiring centralised platforms where they can see OTHER seminar groups beyond their own.
 - iii. Izzy wants to create 4 facebook groups, one for each CC Sem 1 subject, and have these be a source/place for people to upload their notes.
 - 1. Through this, she seeks to create a culture of communal learning in the school and have this culture be perpetuated for future years.
- 5. Help from govt requested: the authority + legitimacy to turn facebook groups into a major endeavour.
- 6. Another obstacle faced: faculty involvement. Especially regarding issues like plagiarism, Izzy needs to get faculty in the loop
 - a. Feroz: Are you aware of Facebook Academic Resource Hub?
 - i. Izzy: Yes but we need something more centralised, more official, to add on to that. I want to set of a culture that makes everything more efficient and centralised.
- 7. Dave: Do you worry if this will disincentivize people from taking notes?

Follow-up from Izzy where necessary.

No govt-level action required.

- a. Izzy: People who need it anyway would want to take notes. I want to start with Common Curriculum first. Thinking of something visual, casual and social, with links to contact people who put it up there.
- 8. YZ: Beyond pooling of resources, what kind of centralisation are you pushing for?
 - a. Izzy: Mostly, it's just resources. If anything else is added, that's an unintended consequence.
- 9. Dave: There are a variety of options right now to communicate/have discussions, e.g. Canvas boards, IVLE forum, Government's website, etc.
 - a. One meaningful suggestion is a commons.yale-nus.edu.sg website, through which participation is restricted to matriculated YNC students.
 - i. This also uses Wordpress, which would potentially be an efficient way to provide content.
 - 1. Izzy: is Commons the go-to for creating websites in YNC? potential for 9gag/reddit-esque mediums.
 - 2. Dave: right now, this is the case for student groups. KidsAccomplish, GCC, Week 7 -- all of these have commons websites.
 - ii. Izzy: is centralising a desirable aim to begin with?
 - 1. Yongzhi: beyond pooling of resources, what does this centralisation mean?
 - 2. Izzy: updates and announcements, student organisation activities, links to canvas, links to clubs and groups -- one go-to page, a one-stop shop where all resources are accessible.
 - 3. Dave: this kind of endeavour is in the spirit of the Common Curriculum -- it's a concretiser/multiplier of the conversations e.g. about Nietzsche that happen organically in the dining hall.

- a. The idea of it evolving and becoming a platform for announcements is even better a platform for announcements is even more needed now, given that College students page is getting extremely cluttered.
- 4. Tee: centralisation has the potential to be much more efficient.
 - a. However, faculty buy-in is important.
 - b. The administration seems to be broadly supportive (e.g. DFs), but, going forward, we do not know if their enthusiasm may flag.
 - c. The more important discussion may not be about the design of the website, but of the type of support that the government can render.
- 5. Dave: many universities in the UK have similar internet infrastructure for updates, assignments etc.
- iii. YZ: are there existing resources that can provide the information to people that you can **direct** people to, rather than replace?
 - 1. Dave: there's nothing really inter-class the next best thing we have right now is the Academic Resource Hub, which is used in a much more casual frame.
 - 2. Izzy: Common Curriculum resource sharing can be a smaller, faster project that has potential to expand (and include/direct to other resources) later on.
 - 3. YZ: so, is peer-to-peer sharing of resources (in the status quo) insufficient for the needs of the school? Do the academic demands of courses require or encourage certain levels of peer-to-peer sharing?

- a. Dave: it varies a lot from section to section, class to class. BUT: there's no way of rectifying teaching differences.
- b. Izzy: especially for SI, a section being taught by an expert on that particular topic will be in a much better position - and can potentially share its notes to make it better for others who are not in the seminar group.
- iv. Tee: what kind of resources can the government provide?
 - 1. e.g. Dave's experience with Commons,
 - 2. Do they need funds?
 - 3. Ground sensing from the government, especially refaculty opinion.
- v. Bing: why is faculty buy-in necessary?
 - 1. if this is going to be a facet of the student experience of the CC, then it's important for faculty to know and understand.
- vi. Dave: regarding continuing the culture, it could be crucial to have classes make their notes accessible to the classes that come after them e.g. 2019 shares with 2020, etc.
- vii. Izzy: students will always be different, and interactions between students and the content will always differ.
- viii. Maria (via Tee): Potential for tie-in with the new Student Services Centre soon to be started up.
- b. CONCLUSION: Government supports the venture.

- 4. Tee: there should be an overarching policy, but this should be applied across the school, not within each seminar group. Guidelines can be set, but professors should not be micromanaged for each absence.
- 5. Dave: having a co-ordinating body helps to alleviate vast differences between professors.
 - a. Problem of faculty, VRs, and DOS unilaterally deciding Yale-NUS's "strategic interests."
 - b. But, it should not be up to the panel to discuss what is in Yale-NUS' best interests.
 - c. Government needs to come up with a response (a position they advocate for) and then push for this response with the administration.
- 6. Tee: Acads cannot front this initiative, owing to conflicts of interest. Student orgs should head.
- 7. Maria: it's not fundamentally an academics concern.
- 8. Tee: More broadly, student grades are being affected. If we as a government judge this to be unfair, then our duty is to advocate for the students' interests.
- 9. Dave: what's problematic about admin's response is that it appears to be a blanket response to a single event. This seems very arbitrary.
- 10. Student Orgs will deal with larger policy on absences for student events.
- 11. Tee: we should take a vote on government's action in the short term to deal with the effect to students. Either craft out how we're dealing with this now, or give IPA for some kind of action, then allow Acads/Orgs to deal with the issue further.
 - a. Speak to Dean of Faculty about this specific issue, and ask whether or not this is the correct way to deal with absences **incurred as a result of YMA.** Is it alright for professors to have a meeting and penalise students to whom they have already given prior consent to miss their class?
