## Committee Debrief

### 1. Academics

#### a. Timetabling

- i. Professors were upset that students were requesting to change course times.
- ii. Suggestion for Government to work with Registry to push out a survey of sorts to understand timetable clashes before the official time table is released
  1. Maria: This is a tedious process. Not a problem of should we do it, but CAN we do it. Registry gives Head of Studies the timetable of classes for approval. Problem might be with Head of Studies not checking before approval.
  2. Dave: Canvas opinion on level of satisfaction with current process because it's usually a case of want, than need.
  3. Ami: Current system where students organically organise to change timings work.
    - a. Tee: Change of course for one person will have ramifications on others. Moreover, not everybody is on Facebook.
    - b. Feroz: Start a mailing list for students who are interested in a class so that all will be informed if there is a change in time.
  4. Jay: Talk to Registry to find out future plans and if they are aware of the current problem.

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Should we include Faculty in mascot voting

Should we include Faculty in mascot voting?

1. Suggested by Faculty. Brought up by Public Affairs as well.
2. Arguments for:
  - a. Creates a greater sense of community
  - b. Mascot will also represent the Faculty
  - c. Their input will lend it more weight with the Cabinet
3. Arguments against:
  - a. Logistics
  - b. We are the Student Government and we should be focusing more on student opinion
  - c. Some students might be upset with involving Faculty
  - d. Faculty make up a substantive proportion and have rather skewed demographics
    - i. Suggestion to give them a weightage, but we need to justify the weightage.
4. Maria: Arguments against are invalid because 1) logistics can be resolved by us, 2) this mascot survey involves the wider YNC community
5. **MOTION:** This house believes that we should include faculty, and only faculty, in addition to students, in the mascot voting process. (PASS)
  - a. Yes: Jay, Maria, Bing, Ami, Zach
  - b. Absent: Qis
  - c. Abstain: Yongzhi, Feroz, Dave
  - d. No: Jared, Tee
6. How should we include the Faculty?
  - a. Give them a link which is different from the student link
  - b. Issue of recognition of identity of Faculty
    - i. Use staff numbers
7. Should we include Staff?
  - a. Maria: We should not include Staff because they do not have a strong tie with the identity of the school compared to Professors.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Zach: Nature of Professor positions is different from that of Staff. Staff positions are more transient. Decision to become a student or professor in Yale-NUS is defining of their lives. There are distinctions made between Faculty and Staff. Staff like Doris Sohmen-Pao are very few, and these members of staff will still have a say at the end of the process.</li> <li>b. Ami: Might differ depending on the type of Staff. For example, Doris Sohmen-Pao might have a greater stake in the mascot than other staff.</li> <li>c. Tee: Very hard to differentiate between types of Staff. Either open it to everyone in the community or keep it among students. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Jared: We are not in the position to adjudicate who is worthy to vote on this or not. We should just open up the vote to the entire community.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	
<p>Revisiting issue of “no to government” vote</p>	<p><u>Revisiting issue of “no to government” vote</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Ballot paper to choose between constitutions, and a second ballot paper on whether the voters wants the constitution or not to renew mandate.</li> <li>2. 2 completely separate ballots: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Do you want a constitution?</li> <li>b. Do you want the new constitution?</li> </ul> </li> <li>3. There might be dissent among student body if they are not allowed to vote for “no to government”.</li> <li>4. Feroz: What if students vote “no to government”? It will be detrimental to the student body. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Yongzhi: Every Government needs majority support to function. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Dave: They should decide if they need a Government, we should not decide for them. We cannot assume that the mandate stands, even though I suspect and hope that they will vote in favour of a government.</li> </ul> </li> <li>b. Jay: Neither outcome is worth the effort and risk. People can spoil their vote if they want to vote “no to government”. Does not increase</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	

	<p>legitimacy of the Government. Does not think it should happen at the same time as Constitution voting because of limited participation.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Tee: There will only be increased participation because mascot and constitution are being reviewed at the same time.</li> <li>c. Maria: Fear that the school does not take this “no to government” vote seriously. They might just not care but vote “no to government”. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Dave: It is problematic that the Government does not seem to support democracy and believes that trolls will skew the votes. If you are so scared about trolls why even have a ratification process in the first place? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Maria: Not a question about democracy. If students do not want a Government, they have the ability to dissolve it through petitioning.</li> <li>2. Dave: While that is true, it is more difficult through the current petition process and relies on the majority to be vocal, which they might not be.</li> </ul> </li> <li>d. Dave: If there is a concern about turnout number then these concerns apply to the ratification as a whole and we should reconsider our quorum requirement</li> </ul> </li> </ul> <p>5. <b>MOTION:</b> This house believes that there should be a separate “no government/ yes government” ballot alongside the ratification vote. (PASS)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Yes: Yongzhi, Dave, Tee, Bing, Feroz (with rights), Ami, Zach</li> <li>b. No: Maria</li> <li>c. Absent: Qis</li> <li>d. Abstain: Jared, Jay</li> </ul> <p>6. Vote counting for the ratification will be done by volunteers as the Constitution Review Committee has a vested interest. We can use computer stations for the “no government/ yes government” vote.</p>	
Jay’s Exhortation	<p><u>Jay’s Exhortation</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Encourage those who are not abroad to run because elections will not be competitive due to number of positions.</li> </ul>	

	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>2. Most probably Freshmen dominated Government who require experienced voice and guidance.</li> <li>3. Dave is willing to run again, but has made a commitment not to run again upon joining the Constitution Review Committee. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Tee: People who have invested a substantive time crafting the Constitution should not be allowed to run because they have a vested interest when reviewing the Constitution.</li> <li>b. Jay: There might be a justification to remove this rule because we might be diluting the talent pool. Those involved have been under the impression that they cannot run and therefore do not have vested interest up to this point.</li> <li>c. Maria: The public has the power to vote against them if they object.</li> <li>d. Jared: Vote should be tabled to next meeting because the Constitution Review process is not over. If we vote today and if it passes, there might be attempts to influence the Constitution before it is completed. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Zach: In theory, since the idea of allowing Constitution Review Committee members to run again exists, there might already be vested interest. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Jared: At least we absolve ourselves of responsibility on paper.</li> </ol> </li> <li>ii. Tee: Constitution may still change during the public comment period, so we can only vote after the public comment period (next Friday).</li> </ol> </li> <li>e. Tee: Sees no reason why the principle should sway at this time although there are capable members in the Constitution Review Committee. It might come across as Government controlling who is eligible to run. Members of the Constitution Review Committee can still run, but they run the risk of being disqualified. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Jay: The decisions made by the Student Government are binding.</li> </ol> </li> </ol> </li> </ol>

Tee: No, they can still run, but they will just be disqualified.</p> <p>f. <b>MOTION:</b> The members and former members of the Constitution Review Committee, except the Devil’s Advocate, should not be allowed to run for the Government next semester.
